What did we do on Tuesday? Prepped and planted a few beds and started making paths through the garden. As many veteran volunteers know, vegetables break out into cool weather and hot weather crops. Tuesday, we got a start on some cool-weather varieties, including radishes and sugar snap peas. We had excellent weather in which to work. Cool and no rain!
